1. Introduction

Over the last few years, the Council has seen rapid changes to the organisation as the number of programmes and the scope of the programmes have grown. The constitution of the Council was amended in 2014, and the ExCo subcommittees were formed in 2015.

In the meantime, the staff count at the Council has grown from 5 in 2011 to 10 in 2015. In 2016 a new member of staff has joined with the new portfolio to manage the NAC 2-year campaign to promote Singapore Literature.

Most recently in 2015, the Storytelling Festival was cancelled to allow for better allocation of resources, and a strategic review was undertaken to assess the impact of the Council's programmes and activities in the Singapore context.

c. Executive Committee Meetings

The Council's Executive Committee met 4 times between August 2015 to July 2016 to review the Council's activities and programmes, and to provide advice and direction on future projects and festivals. In addition, the secretariat staff met with the Chairperson on several occasions at her office for detailed planning and updates.

3. New Initiatives

a. Strategic Review

In November 2015, the Executive Committee participated in a Management Retreat for a strategic review exercise with consultants from Bain & Co. Prior to the Retreat in November, the consultant approached various members of the literary arts and publishing community for their comments and feedback on the existing work of the Council. These comments and feedback were shared with the ExCo and other community stakeholders at the Retreat. Bain & Co. also presented a comparison of the Council to a selection of comparable literary organisations in other countries. From the findings presented, several immediate changes were taken on board and other recommendations noted for future planning.

A key outcome of the Review was a revision of the Council's Vision, Mission, and Objectives:

VISION

To develop and promote Singapore's books and literary arts sector

MISSION

 To serve the community of professionals in the books and literary arts sector and be a platform for them to network, learn and collaborate to achieve global recognition

OBJECTIVES

- To continually build the skill-set of professionals in the books and literary arts sector
- To give awards and recognition to encourage excellence
- To organise programmes and festivals to raise professional and community engagement
- To network with relevant local stakeholders and agencies to foster fellowship and enhance support
- To network with relevant stakeholders and agencies to increase the global footprint of our community

b. Outreach and Collaboration

Over the last two years, the Chairperson has initiated a series of familiarisation visits to relevant government agencies and other organisations.

Apart from familiarising the personnel at these organisations with the varied work of the Council, the opportunity was also taken to identify areas of overlap, as well as possible areas of consolidation and cooperation. One such outcome was to match the dates of the All In! Young Writers Festival to the Words Go Round programme organised by National Arts Council / Singapore Writers Festival, as well as having shared programming.

The agencies and organisations visited were the National Arts Council (NAC), National Library Board (NLB), National Heritage Board (NHB), Ministry of Education (MOE), Early Childhood Development Agency (ECDA), Tan Chin Tuan Foundation (TCTF), Storytelling Association of Singapore (SAS), National Archives of Singapore (NAS),

Some of the outcomes of these meetings were:

- ECDA has endorsed the Council's AFCC programme by supporting teachers to attend.
- A decision to match the timings of the All In! Young Writers Festival and NAC's Words Go Round was made, with NAC providing several speakers to the All In! programme.
- NLB reaffirmed its commitment to provide venue support for the Council's programmes.
- The Council will offer storytellers and writers for NHB's language festivals.
- MOE is tapping on the Council's expertise for connections with publishers and writers.
- The Council met with SAS to suggest that they continue the Singapore International Storytelling Festival.

c. New Book Award

The Asian Children's Book Award was launched during AFCC 2016, with the support of Genting Singapore. This award is open to publishers, authors, and illustrators from across Asia.

7. Festivals

a. Asian Festival of Children's Content - 25 to 29 May 2016

AFCC 2016 was the 7th edition of the Festival, featuring Japan as the country-of-focus. This also coincided with SJ50, the celebration of 50 years of diplomatic relations between Singapore and Japan.

AFCC 2016 drew 729 conference delegates to the 5-day Festival that featured 4 major conferences (Writers & Illustrators Conference, Cross-Platform Summit, Teachers Congress and Parents Forum). There were a total of 116 speakers (58 local, 58 international), 43 moderators and 114 sessions, which included 3 Masterclasses, 2 Speed Pitching sessions, Portfolio Review, Rights Exchange, First Look: Illustration Critique and First Pages: Writing Critique. A total of 30 tickets were purchased for the 3 Masterclasses, and 203 participants attended the 9 Fun with Languages programmes.

In addition, another 1,915 participants attended Book and Product launches and 729 participants attended the 6 special programmes (Opening Ceremony and Award Presentation, Celebrating Our Stars, Japan Night, Children's Literature Lecture, Makan & Mingle, Young Author Award Finale 2015/2016), along with an estimated 8,500 visitors to the AFCC Book Fair, Book Illustrators Gallery and Japanese Picture Book Exhibition.

Speakers and delegates to AFCC 2016 came from 22 different countries, including for the first time, participants from Bangladesh, Brazil, Ghana, Iran, Ireland, Korea, Pakistan, and Thailand.

Highlights of AFCC

1. Collaboration with Lee Kuan Yew Fund for Bilingualism—AFCC Fun with Languages

Held two weekends before AFCC, these free public programmes for parents and children were conducted in Mandarin, Malay, and Tamil. A total of 9 Fun with Languages programmes were held at 3 regional libraries in Bishan Public Library, Tampines Regional Library and Woodlands Regional Library.

2. Collaboration with Media Development Authority—AFCC Cross Platform Summit

Previously named as AFCC Media Summit, the name was changed due to feedback from the industry, to better reflect current trends. The sessions in the Cross Platform Summit are intended to expose writers to alternative platforms for their work, while introducing industry professionals and commissioners to content creators.

3. Skype session with Shaun Tan

One of the most popular sessions in the Festival was the Skype interview with the renowned illustrator and author Shaun Tan. The interview was conducted by a panel comprising Dr Ken Spillman, Dr Myra Garces Bacsal, Adeline Foo, and Dave Liew. Shaun was able to share his thoughts with the audience of about 120, via Skype.

4. Japan Night

Over 200 guests and AFCC speakers attended this night of celebration, hosted by Resorts World Sentosa at the S.E.A. Aquarium. Two collaborative picture books were launched, as well as the new Asian Children's Book Award. Entertainment for the evening was provided by students from The Little Arts Academy, CHIJ Kellogg Choir, and Little Creators.

5. AFCC Book Fair

The AFCC Book Fair (previously known as the Media Mart) held at the NLB Plaza, featured the Country of Focus booth and the Festival Bookstore, and over 40 booths showcasing a wide selection of quality children's book titles from local and international publishers.



There were more programmes for illustrators at AFCC 2016 including:

1. AFCCSketch

An online competition, AFCCSketch drew 102 submissions from illustrators in 15 countries. The participants had to draw an original illustration based on the keywords "birds", "friendship" and "Japan". Two winners received complimentary passes to attend the Festival.

2. Book Illustrators Gallery (14 May to 3 June)

This regular feature of AFCC showcased over 100 works by 70 illustrators from around the world, in the exhibition space of the Central Public Library at NLB Victoria Street.

3. Portfolio Review

This was a new programme where student-illustrators or illustrators new to the industry could show their portfolio of work to, and receive some tips and guidance from their seniors.

4. Exhibition: History of Japanese Picture Books (24 May to 10 July)

"The History of Japanese Picture Books: from E-inagkyo to The Family of Fourteen" was an exhibition jointly organised by the Council and Chihiro Art Museum. It featured the artworks of 6 celebrated Japanese artists: Suekichi Akaba, Takeshi Motai, and Yasuo Segawa, Shinta Cho, Chihiro Iwasaki and Kazuo Iwamura.

From the oldest illustrated manuscript in the 8th century to the contemporary picture books seen today, this unique exhibition traced the evolution of books in Japan through a fine collection of high quality reprints of historical documents and images.

b. All In! Young Writers Festival - 12 to 13 March 2016


The All In! Young Writers Festival is an annual festival for aspiring writers between the ages of 13 and 25. This event brings together a wide array of writing mentors and industry players in publishing, broadcasting, blogging, creative writing, screenwriting and journalism, and advertising, among others, to meet, mingle and share their expertise with today's young writers. The Festival showcases successful industry players who have chosen writing careers and the paths they took to get there.

A total of 323 delegates participated in All In! Young Writers Festival 2016, which was supported by the National Arts Council as an Art Education Programme (AEP). Other partners include the Media Development Authority (MDA) and the National Youth Council (NYC). Forty-eight speakers (45 local, 3 international) and 9 moderators conducted a total of 36 sessions, including 1 keynote session, 15 panel discussions, 1 masterclass, 6 workshops, 3 competitions, 5 fringe activities, 2 partner presentations and 3 NAC-Words Go Round sessions.

This was the 8th edition of All In! and the biggest so far, with 275 tickets bought by students and an additional 48 masterclass tickets supported by MDA. The Festival also launched the ASEAN Young Short Filmmakers Exhibition, 2 book launches of students' works, 3 paper presentations by selected student-essayists, and film exhibitions from winners of the National Youth Film Awards and Singapore Polytechnic.

Highlights of All In!

1. Collaboration with Singapore Writers Festival-Words Go Round

After discussions held with the National Arts Council and the Festival Director of the Singapore Writers Festival (SWF), it was decided that the dates of All In! would be aligned with those of the SWF Words Go Round programme. SWF then contributed 4 Singaporean and 2 international speakers to the All In! line up, with the All In! event being the culmination of the two-week long SWF Words Go Round programme.

2. Collaboration with Media Development Authority

All In! also partnered with MDA and NTUC U-Creative to host a Game Writing Masterclass on the day prior to the Festival. The Masterclass trainer was Toiya Finley, from the International Game Developers Association (USA).

3. Collaboration with National Youth Council

The National Youth Council also supported "All Out for All In", a follow-up event that was held on 23 April with musical performances of songs created at the lyric writing workshop prior to All In!

8. Awards

a. Singapore Literature Prize 2016

The Singapore Literature Prize 2016 Award Ceremony was held on 14 July 2016 at the Regent Hotel. Over 200 people attended the event, including judges, shortlisted authors, publishers, distributors, booksellers, editors, translators and other guests.

The earlier announcement of the winners, compared to previous years, will allow for the winners to be better featured in the Singapore Writers Festival in November.

For the first time ever, MPH agreed to be the official bookstore for SLP and carry all the shortlisted titles in all 4 languages for 18 months after the shortlist announcement on 12 May.

The award presentation held on 14 July was only one part of the comprehensive SLP programme. From the announcement of the shortlist on 12 May till 14 July, many of the shortlisted authors were invited to speak on panels, talking about their shortlisted works.

b. Samsung KidsTime Authors Award 2016

The Samsung KidsTime Authors Award was presented for the 2nd time at AFCC 2016. Winners from across Southeast Asia were given cash prizes of \$2,000 as well as assistance to develop their books and manuscripts into apps for the Android platform. This year, 145 entries were received from six ASEAN nations. However, due to corporate changes at the sponsor, Samsung, this award was discontinued after AFCC 2016.

d. S.E.A. Write 2016

The Scholastic Picture Book Award is a biennial award for the best unpublished picture book manuscript and illustrations from across Asia. Last presented at AFCC 2015, entries are now open for the next edition, to be given out at AFCC 2017. The closing date for entries is 16 Dec 2016.

g. Asian Children's Book Award 2017

The Asian Children's Book Award is a new award for the best children's book published in Asia. Supported by Genting Singapore, the award was launched at AFCC 2016, and will be presented at AFCC 2017. The closing date for entries is 15 Jan 2017.

9. Training


Academy of Literary Arts & Publishing (ALAP)

12. Publications

a. Bridges, Dragons, and Books: Reflections on Asian Children's Literature

Bridges, Dragons, and Books is a compilation of interviews and papers from AFCC 2015. It is the 4th in a series published since 2013.

b. Take Flight: An Annotated Bibliography of Bird-themed picture books

Take Flight! is an annotated bibliography showcasing a selection of more than 100 bird-themed picture books from Asia and around the world, both fiction and non-fiction, which can be used as a teaching resource that helps parents and book lovers find interesting books to read.

It is available both in print and as a pdf for download.

c. Benji, Yumi, Origami! and Monster Day on Tabletop Hill

These were two AFCC collaborative picture book projects designed to showcase talents from both Japan and Singapore. *Benji, Yumi, Origami!* was written by Singaporean author Emily Lim-Leh, illustrated by Japanese artist Kazumi Wilds and translated by Yumiko Fukumoto.

The second book *Monster Day on Tabletop Hill* was written by a Japanese author Akiko Sueyoshi, illustrated by Singaporean artist David Liew and translated by Cathy Hirano.


Both books were launched at the S.E.A. Aquarium during AFCC Japan Night, in a spectacular, one of a kind, underwater book launch.

d. Beyond Words Malay and Tamil Picture Books

Five Malay picture book titles *Anak Ayam, Nasi Lemak Yayi Pantai Changi, Payung Datuk Adil, Saya Seekor Harimau, Tiga, Dua, Satu... Zoom!* and three Tamil picture book titles, *Aalu Vaalu, Luluvum Sundeliyum, Kundamma Kendamma,* were published under the NAC Beyond Words project.


Two publishers were engaged to develop the books. For the Malay titles, the publisher was Mini Monsters, and for the Tamil titles, the publisher was Crimson Earth.

The Council was managing the project on behalf of NAC.



13. Community Outreach

a. Twilight Tales

c. Book Launches

With many more publishers now organising their own book launches, the Council has seen the number of requests for ad-hoc book launches plummet, although there are still requests for venue booking assistance. In November 2015, the Council organised the launch of *Dining with Dragons* with venue sponsorship from the National Library Board.

However, AFCC is growing in popularity as a venue at which to launch children's books. The Council was able to accommodate requests to launch 39 new titles from Singaporean publishers and also some visiting authors at AFCC 2016.

d. Language Programmes

1. Storytelling at Bulan Bahasa (September 2015)

The Council worked with NHB to feature an author and storyteller Jumaini Ariff, with storytelling performances during Bulan Bahasa, at four events held at Gardens by the Bay, Marine Parade Public Library and Woodlands Regional Library.

2. Tamil Language Festival (April 2016)

The Council worked with NHB to feature storytellers Re Somasundaram and M Puravalan, and facilitator Karthikeyan Somasundaram in the Tamil Language Festival held at the Indian Heritage Centre.

3. AFCC Fun With Languages (May 2016)

Nine programmes in Chinese, Malay, and Tamil were held over one weekend at Bishan Regional Library, Woodlands Regional Library, Tampines Regional Library.

4. Singapore Literature Prize panels (May 2016 onwards)

Following the SLP shortlist announcement in May 2016, a number of author talks have been conducted, with some in Chinese, Malay, and Tamil.

e. New Delhi World Book Fair 2016

The Council participated in the New Delhi World Book Fair from 9 to 17 January, 2016, with a display booth featuring the latest titles from Singaporean publishers.

A small delegation of five authors (four supported by NAC and one self-funded) participated from 13 to 17 January, and they were featured in two talks at the Book Fair, school visits, and a book shop event. Authors also organised their own meetings with publishers and agents at the Book Fair.

f. MTLS Consolidated Sales Booth

The Council was appointed by the Mother Tongue Language Symposium to manage a Consolidated Sales Booth at their event in August 2015. This work involved coordinating with different selected publishers of Chinese, Malay, and Tamil books and educational materials intended for preschool and early primary students. The Council was appointed to manage the booth again for the next event in August 2016.

g. NAC Campaign

NBDCS has been appointed by NAC as the secretariat for a 2 year campaign which aims to raise the profile of Singapore books and authors, and to encourage readers to buy and read more Singapore literature. The campaign involves working partners from the commercial sector, including publishers, distributors, and booksellers. The details of the campaign will be announced in August 2016.

h. Budding Writers Project

The Council renewed its support of the Budding Writers programme for primary and secondary school studeOnts, organised by the publisher, Marshall Cavendish.


i. National Schools Literature Festival
